THE 2015 CHAMPIONS TOUR: This year marks the 36th anniversary of the PGA TOUR's Champions Tour and the Insperity Invitational is the eighth official event on the 2015 schedule. The last of 26 official events this year is the Charles Schwab Cup Championship, November 2-8, at Desert Mountain Golf Club in Scottsdale, Arizona. The Champions Tour's primary purpose is to provide significant competitive and earnings opportunities for players age 50 and older, to protect the integrity of the game and to help grow the reach of the game in the U.S. and around the world. This year's Insperity Invitational will be the 1,043rd official event in Champions Tour history and this is the 12th anniversary of the tournament.

CHARLES SCHWAB AGREES TO 20-YEAR SPONSORSHIP: The PGA TOUR and Charles Schwab & Co., Inc. announced on Jan. 20, 2015 a historic 20-year extension of their multifaceted marketing partnership. This represents the longest marketing agreement the PGA TOUR has ever entered. In conjunction with the extension, the Champions Tour will be creating a playoff system beginning with the 2016 season, with details on the structure forthcoming.

- This historic 20-year extension of the multifaceted marketing relationship between PGA TOUR and Charles Schwab & Co. will continue through 2033.
- This represents the longest marketing agreement the PGA TOUR has ever entered.
- The Champions Tour will create a playoff system for the Charles Schwab Cup with structure and timing forthcoming.
- Every official Champions Tour event carries Schwab Cup points for the top-10 finishers.
- The agreement signals stability of the Champions Tour and the Charles Schwab Cup.

GIVING BACK: In addition to free admission/parking for fans, proceeds from this year's Insperity Invitational will again benefit local Houston charities. The tournament will also partner again with the Houston affiliate of the Susan G. Komen for the Cure. Fans are also encouraged to wear pink when they attend the tournament on Saturday to help raise awareness for breast cancer research. Since the first Insperity Invitational in 2004, almost \$10 million has been donated to charity.

2014 TOURNAMENT RECAP: It was a duel between two World Golf Hall of Fame members in the end. Despite playing his last 11 holes without a birdie and making two bogeys in his final three holes, Bernhard Langer held off a charging Fred Couples by a stroke to win his third Insperity Invitational. Couples had an up-and-down front nine, but he birdied the 10th hole to get within six strokes of Langer. Couples then proceeded to birdie four straight holes (Nos. 12-15) and pulled within a stroke when Langer failed to get up and down from the greenside bunker at the par-3 16th hole. However, Couples' approach at the final hole went long and after an indifferent chip shot, he missed a five-foot par putt, allowing Langer to play the final hole with a two-stroke cushion. Langer bogeyed the last hole, but still managed a one-stroke victory at The Woodlands Country Club.

Key Storylines

BERNHARD LANGER DEFENDS INSPERITY TITLE; SHOOTS FOR RARE FOURTH VICTORY AT THE SAME EVENT: Bernhard Langer, the only player to win consecutive Insperity Invitational titles (2007-2008), seeks to duplicate what he did seven years ago and if successful, he'd join some select company of Champions Tour players to win the same event four or more times. Only Hale Irwin (1997, 2000 Kaanapali Classic; 2001, 2002, 2003, 2005 Turtle Bay Championship), (1996, 1997, 1998, 2004 PGA Championship) and Jack Nicklaus (1990, 1991, 1995, 1996 Tradition) have won the same tournament four or more times. Langer, a four-time Champions Tour Player of the Year, (2008, 2009, 2010, 2014), is also hoping to claim his first title in 2015. In his Champions Tour career, Langer has only had one full season where he's not won within the first eight events (2012). Kirk Triplett is the last player to defend a title on the Champions Tour, claiming his second straight Nature Valley First Tee Open at Pebble Beach in 2013.

LANGER IN RARIFIED AIR ON ALL-TIME VICTORY LIST: Bernhard Langer's fifth and final victory of the 2014 season, at the Dick's Sporting Goods Open, gave him 23 career titles on the Champions Tour, tying him with Bob Charles for fifth place on the all-time victory list. Should Langer win at the Insperity Invitational, he would tie Miller Barber for fourth place on the all-time wins list. Here's what's

possibly ahead of Langer this year as he makes his 154th career start on the Champions Tour at this year's Insuperity Invitational:

Lee Trevino -- 29 titles; 24th title came in 106th career start/1994 Northville Long Island Classic
Gil Morgan -- 25 titles; 24th title came in 241st career start/2006 Allianz Championship (Des Moines)
Miller Barber -- 24 titles; 24th title came in 169th career start/1989 Vintage Chrysler Invitational

INSPERITY EVENT AN INVITATIONAL: For the second consecutive year, the Insuperity Invitational will feature a unique criteria for their 81-player field. The eligibility for the event will include: 1) exempt members of the World Golf Hall of Fame; 2) Winners of major championships on the Champions Tour over the last five years; 3) top 20 available from prior-year money list; 4) top 20 available from all-time money list; 5) top player from the prior-year European Senior Tour, the PGA Australia Legends Tour and Asian Senior Tour Order of Merit; 6) winners of Champions Tour events since the prior-year's Insuperity Invitational; 7) the top player from the most recent Champions Tour National Qualifying Tournament; 8) at the invitation of the tournament and in order to fill the field, winners of a PGA TOUR, Champions Tour, European Tour or European Senior Tour tournament.

STELLAR FIELD ON HAND: This year's Insuperity Invitational features nine members of the World Golf Hall of Fame (Fred Couples, Ben Crenshaw, Hale Irwin, Bernhard Langer, Nick Price, Tom Kite, Sandy Lyle, Curtis Strange and Colin Montgomerie) as well as 2015 inductee Mark O'Meara. Overall, 62 players in the field have combined to win 439 PGA TOUR events, including 22 professionals who have combined for 33 major championships.

JANZEN, PARNEVIK HIGHLIGHT NEW FACES AT INSUPERITY: Two-time U.S. Open champion Lee Janzen and Sweden's Jesper Parnevik, a winner of five PGA TOUR titles and one of golf's most colorful characters, highlight the list of players making their first appearances at the Insuperity Invitational this year. Janzen joined the Champions Tour late last summer and in addition to a pair of U.S. Open titles, he won six other PGA TOUR events, including the 1995 PLAYERS Championship. Janzen has already won on the Champions Tour, claiming this year's ACE Group Classic in Naples. In eight appearances on the PGA TOUR at the Shell Houston Open, Janzen was T4 in 1998 and T2 in 2001. Parnevik joined the Champions Tour in March at the Tucson Conquistadores Classic. He made only three appearances in Houston on the PGA TOUR and none since 1998. Other PGA TOUR winners scheduled to make their first appearances at the Insuperity Invitational are: Stephen Ames, Woody Austin, Paul Goydos and Kevin Sutherland. Also playing in the event for the first time are: Marco Dawson, the winner of this year's Tucson Conquistadores Classic, M. Murugiah from Singapore, the leading player on the Asian Senior Tour and Tim Elliott, the leading player on the PGA Australia Legends Tour.

LEGENDS AGAIN BACK FOR 3M OIL & GAS GREATS OF GOLF COMPETITION: Fans attending this year's Insuperity Invitational on Saturday will again have a rare opportunity to see many of golf's greatest players together again at Saturday's 3M Oil & Gas Greats of Golf Competition. World Golf Hall of Fame member Arnold Palmer will be on hand to watch the action and scheduled to play are World Golf Hall of Fame members: Jack Nicklaus, Gary Player, Lee Trevino, Raymond Floyd and Tony Jacklin, as well as 2015 World Golf Hall of Fame inductee David Graham. Rounding out the illustrious group are: Don January, Dave Stockton and, for the first time, Tom Weiskopf. The Greats of Golf competition will again features three, three-man, teams in an 18-hole scramble format. This group includes six World Golf Hall of Fame members and has combined for more than 300 PGA TOUR victories, over 50 major championships and more than 150 Champions Tour titles. Last year, Nicklaus, Trevino and Player teamed to shoot 10-under-par 62 to share the title with Stockton, Johnny Miller and Jacklin, who were the winning threesome in 2013. In the inaugural year of the scramble showdown, Palmer, Nicklaus and Player were the winners.

O'MEARA OFF TO BEST START SINCE 2010: Houston resident Mark O'Meara, a 2015 inductee into the World Golf Hall of Fame, has top-five finishes in three of his first six Champions Tour events (2-Mitsubishi Electric Championship at Hualalai/3-Tucson Conquistadores Classic/T4 Greater Gwinnett Championship) and is off to his best start on the circuit since 2010 when he finished second at the

Outback Steakhouse Pro-Am and then won the Legends of Golf with Nick Price before the end of May. O'Meara also was T22 at The Masters this year, the best performance by a player over 50 in the field, and it was his best effort at Augusta National since a T8 in 2003.

A THIRD COMPLETE: This year's Insperity Invitational will be the eighth official event, signifying that almost a third of the 2015 season will be complete. Here are some of the Champions Tour highlights from the first part of the year:

- Spain's Miguel Angel Jimenez made it two wins in his first three starts on the Champions Tour when he claimed the season-opening Mitsubishi Electric Championship at Hualalai by one stroke over Mark O'Meara.
- Paul Goydos matched his career victory total on the PGA TOUR when he picks up his second title on the Champions Tour, claiming the Allianz Championship in Boca Raton.
- A pair of Florida Southern alums win back-to-back tournaments on the Champions Tour. First, Lee Janzen returned to the winner's circle for the first time in nearly 17 years when he prevailed in a one-hole playoff with Bart Bryant at The ACE Group Classic. Janzen's teammate in college, Marco Dawson, then cracked the winner's circle at the inaugural Tucson Conquistadores Classic, defeating Bryant by two strokes at the Omni Tucson National Resort.
- Two days after Jerry Smith made the first hole-in-one on the 2015 Champions Tour at the Tucson Conquistadores Classic, Rod Spittle made an ace in the final round. It marked the first time a pair of aces were made in the same event since the 2014 Shaw Charity Classic.
- David Frost edged Tom Lehman and Kevin Sutherland at the Mississippi Gulf Resort Classic for his sixth career title on the Champions Tour and first in almost two years. Frost appeared headed for a playoff until Lehman missed a four-foot birdie putt to tie on the final hole.
- Olin Browne ended a victory drought of 3 ½ years when he captured his second career win on the Champions Tour at the rain-shortened Greater Gwinnett Championship. It was Browne's first victory since the 2011 U.S. Senior Open.

MONTY BACK IN FAMILIAR TERRITORY; SEEKING FIRST VICTORY IN 54-HOLE EVENT: After finishing third last year, World Golf Hall of Fame member Colin Montgomerie will make a return trip to the Insperity Invitational and he's looking to win his first 54-hole event on the Champions Tour. Montgomerie won a pair of major titles on the Champions Tour last year, claiming both the Senior PGA Championship and the U.S. Senior Open. Montgomerie graduated from Houston Baptist University in 1987 and helped lead the Huskies to three-straight NCAA Tournament appearances in 1985, 1986 and 1987. While at Houston Baptist, he was the Trans America Athletic Conference Player of the Year in 1985 and set the conference tournament record that season with an 11-under 205. Montgomerie is a member of the first HBU Sports Hall of Honor class in 1997.

OLIN BROWNE GRABS EARLY LEAD IN 2015 SCHWAB CUP COMPETITION: Olin Browne's victory last week in Atlanta, coupled with three other top-10 finishes within the first six events of the 2015 season, moved him atop the Charles Schwab standings. First started in 2001, the Schwab Cup is designed to recognize the Champions Tour's leading player, rewarding both top finishes and week-in/week-out consistency in all official events. The player with the most points at the end of the year will earn a \$1 million payout from Charles Schwab. Throughout the year, players receive points for top-10 finishes and ties based on each week's money distribution, with \$1,000 earned being the equivalent of one Charles Schwab Cup point. Double points are awarded in the five major championships and at the season-ending Charles Schwab Cup Championship at Desert Mountain in Scottsdale, Arizona, November 2-8. Last year, Bernhard Langer won the Charles Schwab Cup for the second time (2010) and joined Tom Lehman (2012, 2013), Hale Irwin (2002, 2004), Tom Watson (2003, 2005), Jay Haas (2006, 2008) and Loren Roberts (2007, 2009) among players who have won the Schwab Cup in multiple seasons.

Tournament Notes

NOTES ON LANGER'S 2014 VICTORY: Here's some facts about Bernhard Langer's third victory at the Insperity Invitational last year:

- Bernhard Langer became the first three-time winner of the Insperity Invitational and, for the first time in his Champions Tour career, he won the same tournament three times. Langer claimed his first-ever Champions Tour title at this event in 2007 at Augusta Pines and followed that win up by successfully defending his title the next year at The Woodlands Country Club.
- Langer became the first player to win the same tournament three times since Jay Haas claimed a third Principal Charity Classic in 2012. It marked the 25th time that a player on the Champions Tour had won the same event three times or more.
- Langer became the 10th player in Champions Tour history with 20 wins or more in his career. He also was the first player since Gil Morgan to win 20 times on the Champions Tour.
- Langer became the first two-time winner on the Champions Tour last year, earning his first win since claiming the season-opening Mitsubishi Electric Championship at Hualalai. His win last year in Houston gave him multiple titles in six seasons on the Champions Tour (2008, 2009, 2010, 2012, 2013, 2014).
- Langer's 20th career title moved him up into a T8 on the all-time Champions Tour victory list with Jim Colbert and Bruce Crampton. He eventually won three more times during the season to move up into T5 on the all-time wins list.
- Langer won his fourth career title in the state of Texas. In addition to three Insperity Invitational victories (2007, 2008, 2014), Langer also won the 2009 Triton Financial Classic in Austin.
- Langer earned a check for \$300,000 and became the first Champions Tour player to eclipse the \$1 million mark in single-season earnings with \$1,170,108 in seven starts this year.
- Langer became the first player to go over the \$1 million mark in Insperity Invitational earnings with \$1,034,569.

RETURNING TO THE SCENE: Fred Funk's win at The Woodlands in 2013 gave him both a PGA TOUR and Champions Tour title at the same venue while Fred Couples' Insperity victory in 2011 also gave him both a PGA TOUR and a Champions Tour title in Houston. Three other players in this year's Insperity Invitational field have an opportunity to join Funk as a winner of both a PGA TOUR and Champions Tour event at the same venue, the Tournament Course at The Woodlands.

- Curtis Strange (1980), Jay Haas (1987), Mark Brooks (1996) and Hal Sutton (2001) all won the Shell Houston Open on this course.
- Should Haas go on to win on the Tournament Course at The Woodlands this year, it would mark the second time he's captured a PGA TOUR/Champions Tour event at the same place. Haas also won events on both Tours at Oak Hills Country Club in San Antonio.
- Both Corey Pavin (1984) and Wayne Levin (1979) won their Shell Houston Open titles at nearby Woodlands Country Club.

FIRST OF TWO IN LONE STAR STATE: The Insperty Invitational is the first of two Champions Tour events in Texas in 2015. Following the Houston event, the Champions Tour returns to San Antonio in October for the San Antonio Championship, the next-to-last full-field event of the season. Mark O'Meara and Jay Haas have come the closest to winning both events in the same season. O'Meara finished second in each tournament in 2007 while Haas was a runner-up in both events in 2009. Bernhard Langer, last year's winner in Houston, was T6 in San Antonio near the end of last season.

THE CHAMPS: Seven of the nine different past champions of the Insperty Invitational – Fred Couples, Jay Haas, Bernhard Langer, John Cook, Brad Faxon, Fred Funk and Esteban Toledo – are in this year's field and have a cumulative total of 74 wins on the Champions Tour. This group has also won a collective 53 times on the PGA TOUR.

CHARTING THE WINNERS: Bernhard Langer's 16 birdies last year marked the second time in the last three years that an Insperty champion totaled that number...Esteban Toledo's six bogeys in 2013 tied for the most by a champion. Larry Nelson made six at the inaugural event in 2004...Only two players have made a double-bogey and recovered to win – Esteban Toledo (2013) and Fred Couples (2010), who triumphed by seven strokes...Esteban Toledo, the 2013 champion, hit the fewest fairways (27/42) by a winner in tournament history but his 77 total putts were the fewest by a winner since Bernhard Langer had just 73 total putts in 2007.

LANGER'S RECORD SCORE: When he won his first career title on the Champions Tour in Houston in 2007, Bernhard Langer's 54-hole total of 25-under-par 191 matched the all-time lowest score in a three-round event in Champions Tour history. Langer made just one bogey in 2007 and his 24 birdies that year are a tournament record. Here are the other times in Champions Tour history where a player has shot this same score. Bruce Fleisher shot 19-under 191 at the 2002 RJR Championship.

BREAKING THEIR MAIDEN: When Brad Faxon triumphed at the 2012 Insperty Invitational in Houston, he became the fourth consecutive first-time winner that season, joining Mark Calcavecchia/Boeing Classic, Jay Don Blake/Songdo IBD Championship, Kenny Perry/SAS Championship. It marked the first time since 2001 that the Champions Tour produced four consecutive first-timers in a season. Is this the year for another first-time winner in Houston?

HAAS ON INSPERTY MARK: Jay Haas tends to play well in Texas. He's won six times on TOUR in the Lone Star State which ties him for top honors with Tom Watson for most victories in Texas among active Champions Tour players. In his 10 appearances at the Insperty Invitational, Haas has been among the top six, seven times including a victory at this event in 2006. He's posted under-par scores in 23 of his 28 career rounds at this event and is a cumulative 74-under-par!

FOLLOW THE LEADERS: In the previous 11 Insperty Invitational events, six second-round leaders/co-leaders have gone on to win (Jay Haas in 2006, Bernhard Langer in 2007, 2008 and 2014, Brad Faxon in 2011 and Fred Funk in 2012). Haas (2006) and Langer (2007, 2014) are the only first-round leaders/co-leaders to win this tournament. The winner has come from the final grouping at the Insperty Championship in seven of the last nine years with 2009 and 2013 being the exceptions.

TOURNAMENT COURSE CONTINUES TO PROVIDE A GOOD TEST: Last year, the Tournament Course at The Woodlands ranked as the fourth hardest (73.535/+1.535) and the most difficult for a non-major on the Champions Tour. In 2013, the course was the third-hardest

on the Champions Tour (74.643/+2.643) and it easily played as the most difficult in event history. The Tournament Course in 2013 was also the toughest for a non major on the Champions Tour. Last year, 20 players broke par in the event after just seven players broke par in the event in 2013. The Tournament Course at The Woodlands ranked as the 10th hardest course in 2010 (72.531), the 11th most difficult layout in 2011 (72.153) and the 15th hardest (71.941) out of 24 courses ranked in 2012. Last year, the par-4 9th (4.348) edged out the par-4 18th (4.287) as the most difficult in 2014. In 2013, The par-4 18th hole was the hardest (4.328), yielding only 15 total birdies.

THEY'VE PLAYED THEM ALL: Just seven players have now competed in all of the 11 Insperty Invitationals – Ben Crenshaw, Bob Gilder, John Harris, Tom Kite, Wayne Levi, D.A. Weibring and Fuzzy Zoeller.

WHERE ARE THE ACES?: There have been just two aces in the history of the Insperty Invitational. When Tom Kite aced the 16th hole in the opening round of the 2013 Insperty Invitational (7-iron, 194 yards), it was his first career hole in one on the Champions Tour. The ace came in his 17, 674th shot on the Champions Tour. J.L Lewis made the first hole-in-one in Insperty Invitational history in 2012. Lewis holed a 4-iron shot from 189 yards on the 16th hole. It was his first ace on the Champions Tour after making two aces in his PGA TOUR career.

OLDEST, YOUNGEST: Bernhard Langer's win in 2007 came just 1 month and 17 days after he turned 50, making him the youngest winner in event history. Larry Nelson, the tournament's inaugural winner in 2004, claimed his Insperty Invitational title at 57 years, 1 month and he's still the oldest winner at this tournament.

INSPERTY INVITATIONAL NUGGETS: The playoff between Mike Goodes, Gene Sauers and Esteban Toledo in 2013 was only the second overtime session in tournament history. The first came in the inaugural event in 2004 when Larry Nelson defeated Hale Irwin with a birdie on the first extra hole...Arnold Palmer played his last competitive round and the last of 319 official Champions Tour events, at the 2006 Insperty Invitational, withdrawing during the opening round of the tournament. Palmer's last official appearance of the PGA TOUR came at the 2004 Masters... Bob Gilder will make his 91st straight appearance on the Champions Tour this week. Gilder has not missed a start on the circuit since skipping the 2011 Greater Hickory Classic at Rock Barn...Bernhard Langer is the event's all-time leading money-winner with \$1,034,569. Jay Haas is second with \$857,119.

ON THIS DATE:

4/27/86 – Curtis Strange and Calvin Peete share the lead after 72 holes, but Strange defeats Peete with a birdie on the third playoff hole for his second Houston Open title.

4/28/96 – Mark O'Meara is a two-stroke winner over Duffy Waldorf at the Greater Greensboro Chrysler Classic. O'Meara's performance included a third-round 10-under-par 62 which matched his career low on the PGA TOUR.

4/28/02 – Jim Thorpe made a three-foot birdie on the 72nd hole and then birdied the first playoff hole (six-footer) to defeat John Jacobs to win The Countrywide Tradition near Phoenix for his first major championship.

4/28/02 – Rocco Mediate won his second title in Greensboro after finishing three better than Mark Calcavecchia at the Greater Greensboro Chrysler Classic.

4/29/01 – Scott Hoch wins for the first time in 94 starts when he fires four straight rounds in the 60s and prevails by one stroke over Scott Simpson and Brett Quigley at the Greater Greensboro Chrysler Classic. Win at age 45 years, 5 months and 5 days makes him the oldest winner since Tom Watson won the 1998 MasterCard Colonial at age 48.

4/29/84 – Just two years removed from UCLA, Corey Pavin wins the first of 15 PGA TOUR titles with a one-stroke victory over Buddy Gardner at the Houston Coca-Cola Open at The Woodlands CC.

4/30/78 – The unofficial Liberty Mutual Legends of Golf hosts its first event with Sam Snead and Gardner Dickinson winning by one stroke over Kel Nagle and Peter Thomson in Austin. It would lead to the formation of what is now the Champions Tour.

4/30/89 – Three weeks after losing in a playoff to Nick Faldo at the Masters, Scott Hoch defeats Robert Wrenn with a birdie on the fifth extra hole to win the Las Vegas Invitational.

4/30/06 – Jay Haas comes from three strokes back in the final round and pulls away for a two-stroke win over Tom Kite and Mark James at the FedEx Kinko's Classic. Haas shoots a 5-under-par 31 on the front nine and needs just 21 putts in his final round. It was his fifth win in the state of Texas in his career. The win came in the **800th Champions Tour event**.

MAY

5/1/05 – Jim Thorpe birdied four of the last five holes at the Hills CC to break away for a four-stroke victory in the FedEx Kinko's Classic in Austin. After his win Thorpe donated his entire winner's check of \$247,500 to his church in Orlando.

5/2/92 – Bob Gilder shoots four consecutive rounds in the 60s and rolls to a five-stroke victory over Curtis Strange at the Byron Nelson Classic. His 72-hole total of 22-under-par 266 was the lowest in the tournament's 16 years at Preston Trail GC.

5/3/92 – Fred Funk ties the Shell Houston Open tournament record with a third-round 62 and then closes with a 70 to defeat Kirk Triplett for his first PGA TOUR victory.

5/3/87 – Paul Azinger holes a 30-foot eagle putt on the final hole to win the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational for his second career win on TOUR. Azinger's final-round 64 gives him a one-stroke win over Hal Sutton for the second time this year (Phoenix Open as well).

5/3/81 – Ron Streck wins the rain-shortened Michelob-Houston Open and earns the distinction of being the first player to win a PGA TOUR event using a metal wood.

5/3/13 – Tom Kite makes his first career ace on the Champions Tour event when he sinks a 7-iron from 194 yards in the opening round at the Insperity Championship. It was the 17,674th hole he had played in competition.
